At the heart of our purpose, Ronald McDonald House Charities WA (RMHC WA) strives to keep sick children and their families together, supported and thriving; far from home at the most difficult time of their lives.

of our environments. For seriously ill children and their families dependent on continued medical treatment, RMHC WA provided one of the safest places for them to be.

With health and safety at the forefront of our COVID-19 response, capacity to support families at the Nedlands House was reduced to 25% during the lockdown and restrictions period, creating numerous challenges for the families that needed us. True to form, our team turned challenge into inspiration and innovation. In collaboration with local accommodation providers, RMHC WA established satellite accommodation options fully supported by RMHC WA every day of their stay. In total, an additional 60 families were supported statewide during April and May ensuring ongoing access to medical treatment of their child.

Additionally, strategic and financial initiatives planned for 2020 were rigorously re-examined in pursuit of optimum sustainability. While tough decisions were made to cancel or postpone much loved community

fundraising programs, we forged new ground and connection across the regions with the launch of our inaugural WA Giving Day. For the first time in our state, RMHC WA presented a 12-hour online fundraising event experience hosted by our enthusiastic patron, Adam Gilchrist live from the Nedlands House. With the support of inspirational businesses passionate about the well-being of regional families, every donation from the community was doubled.

Recognising the heightened significance of digital in every aspect of post pandemic life. RMHC WA elevated its strategic focus on the advancement of digital engagement. In the latter part of 2020, together with our sister chapters across Australia, RMHC Dawn - Our Digital Transformation Journey commenced in earnest with design and development of a fit-forpurpose relationship management ecosystem.

At the outset of 2020, our organisation was poised to embark on new horizons for our service to the Western Australian community. The RMHC WA Strategy 2020-25 set a clear course for the year ahead; advance our systems, structure and partnerships to enable substantial growth across facilities and programs. Our goal is to ensure no family who needs us is turned away due to limited capacity. By 2025 we aim to deliver supported accommodation and services for an additional 50 families per night.

The inevitable reach and impact of the COVID-19 virus in Western Australia underscored a year we reflect upon with great pride. As a not-for-profit operating to support children and families in our health sector, RMHC WA encountered numerous challenges that would define our strength in agility, innovation and resilience.

First and foremost, our Board, management, staff and volunteers demonstrated extraordinary resolve and effort in collective, vigilant protection of the health and safety

A YEAR OF RESILIENCE.

At the heart of our service, we keep families close, far from home during the most difficult time of their lives.

The inevitable reach of the COVID-19 virus in Western Australia challenged RMHC WA at the core of its purpose. These unprecedented circumstances underscored one of the organisation's most inspiring years in its 30 years of service.

The RMHC WA COVID-19 Response Plan was implemented on the 16th March, integrating State Government health directives with Ronald McDonald House Charities' global health and safety protocols. Under the Plan, all RMHC WA accommodation, recreation spaces, Family Retreats, programs and events were subject to limited essential use or temporary closure with rigorous health and safety procedures required throughout.

The Plan ensured RMHC WA could provide a safe and supported environment for children with vulnerable health conditions but created numerous challenges for service delivery, service experience and sustained fundraising.

- Nedlands House accommodation reduced to 25% capacity.
- One parent or guardian only (no siblings, second parent or guardian).
- No visitors.
- Play and recreation spaces closed.
- Family Retreats and Family Rooms closed.
- Learning Program face-to-face tutoring cancelled.
- Cancellation and delay of signature fundraising events.

Together, the collective spirit of staff, families, partners, and the Western Australian community forged a remarkable year of innovations, collaboration and joy.

AGILE SERVICE SOLUTIONS

In collaboration with local providers, RMHC WA established satellite accommodation options fully supported by RMHC WA every day of their stay. In total, an additional 60 regional WA children could access ongoing medical treatment.

VIGILANT HEALTH AND SAFETY

Security services were introduced 24/7 to manage authorised access and health screening procedures. Cleaning regimes were paramount and were conducted on a continuing rotation of all high touch surface areas.



CONTINUED EDUCATION ONLINE

The Ronald McDonald Learning Program moved all tutoring services online to enable continued education for sick kids.

EMPLOYEE MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING

An RMHC WA employee with Counselling qualifications and experience was redeployed as our Wellbeing Coordinator. The success of the redeployment resulted in extending this support to RMHC Victoria/Tasmania. Wellbeing was further supported by access to the Employee Assistance Program.

SUPPORTING THE FRONTLINE

The RMHC WA Operations team, in particular the Family Liaison Officers achieved seamless patient support with Perth Children's Hospital. RMHC WA administration staff adopted volunteer House duties due to restrictions impacting RMHC WA volunteer access.

EMBRACING THE NEW DIGITAL NORMAL

Swift IT and employee support solutions enabled 80% of RMHC WA to continue working productively from home. Employees stayed connected with office chat software including a weekly online social club.

HOME AWAY FROM HOME

With the little things 'back home' often taken for granted, RMHC WA prepared daily care packages with breakfast items, condiments, toiletries, snacks and games. For Easter 2020, the House became a favourite stop for the Easter Bunny to deliver an extravagant chocolate feast of eggs from our friends at Crown.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA SENDS ITS LOVE

A statewide campaign encouraging Western Australians to 'send their love' and support to kids and their carers via social media. The initiative attracted the attention of news media, high profile personalities and people from across the state reaching over 134,000 people.

GLENN BAKER

OUR WESTERN AUSTRALIAN STORY.

Thirty years ago, Glenn Baker OAM pioneered the establishment of Ronald McDonald House Charities in Western Australia. It is more than a charity story it is a family story.

Glenn Baker knows from experience how important it is for families with seriously ill children to have somewhere to stay while their child is in hospital.

In 1985, Glenn's son Adam was diagnosed with leukaemia and began intensive chemotherapy at Perth's Princess Margaret Hospital (PMH). He was aware of the pressing need for somewhere for families to stay – especially those from regional WA – so they could be near their children during their often difficult treatment.

Glenn and his wife Beverley became foundation members of 'The House of Life Group' made up of parents whose children were receiving treatment in the hospital's cancer ward. With community support from Lions and Rotary clubs, Country Women's

Association, Apex and private businesses, the group raised enough funds to start building a 12-bedroom residence on a site donated by the hospital in Subiaco.

After years of fundraising and negotiating with Health Authorities, in early 1989 *The House of Life Group* approached the local McDonald's Owner Operators, (who were small in numbers as the market was in its infancy in WA), for their commitment and support on an ongoing basis.

A Steering Committee was formed comprising of three McDonald's representatives (Mike Manika, Norm Sinclair and Tatt Cork), three representatives from PMH (John Meyers, Ian Lacey and Len Fletcher) and three from *The House of Life Group* (Paul Rumenos, Graham Smith and Glenn Baker).

Ronald McDonald LEARNING PROGRAM

This group was called the *Ronald McDonald House of Life Group* and it was this group that secured the licence to build and operate the first House in Subiaco.

Ronald McDonald House of Life
Perth opened in 1990 and is now
known as Ronald McDonald House
Charities Western Australia. It was
a bitter-sweet moment for Glenn
and his family, as some years earlier
Adam had sadly lost his battle with
cancer.

As Board Chair (2000-2014) and Board Member of Ronald McDonald House Charities WA, Glenn's invaluable contribution for over 30 years is best measured by the thousands of Western Australian families, from every corner of the state, who rely on the care and support provided by RMHC WA every day of the year.

Glenn is the recipient of multiple Community Awards including:

- Inaugural member of RMHC Hall of Fame (2004)
- RMHC Heart Award which is RMHC's highest honour (2008)
- Order of Australia Medal for his contribution to the Charity (2020)

When asked what the highlight of his tenure has been over the past 36 years, Glenn says the building of the two Houses is a stand out.

"Clearly the fundraising for two Houses stands out for me, however, being agile and accepting new opportunities as they arose were the hallmarks of my leadership."

Looking towards the next 30 years, Glenn says that from his perspective the pursuits of the Charity should be the same – agile, inclusive and opportunistic.

"The families with seriously ill children need the services of RMHC more than they know, and we need to provide an everexpanding suite of support services to assist them back into a normal way of family life."

Glenn Baker's contribution to Ronald McDonald House Charities WA has been exceptional.
Our Western Australian story as a service provider to WA families with seriously ill children exists because of Glenn's vision and dedication.
His retirement from the Board of RMHC WA in 2021 will mark the end of an era for the Charity, but his legacy will serve WA families for years to come.



WA'S **RESILIENT** PARENTS.

Rebecca and Russell Pusey live in Geraldton, a 4.5 hour drive from Perth, with their daughters Willow, 12 and April, 16.

Russell is a Secondary Teacher and Rebecca is a Special Needs Education Assistant at local Geraldton schools.

In December 2019, Willow was diagnosed with Hodgkins Lymphoma. A cancer that accounts for 40% of lymphoma cases in children and more commonly in children aged 10 to 14 years.

For Rebecca and Russell the news came as a devastating shock. They could never have imagined their bright, effervescent daughter's life affected by serious illness. "When we found out that we had to be in Perth for 6 to 12 months of medical treatment, that's the saddest moment I had," says Rebecca.

Because of the length of stay, Rebecca stayed with Willow in Perth for her treatment, while Russell and April stayed in Geraldton.

The pair had been staying at a hotel near Perth Children's Hospital and was offered a place at Ronald McDonald House.

Willow's hair started falling out 3 weeks into staying at the House.

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit in March, Willow was still undergoing treatment. Regional border and Government restrictions meant April and Russell could not visit Rebecca and Willow for weeks.

During the COVID-19 pandemic RMHC WA was a home away from home for Rebecca and Willow. Despite being hundreds of kilometres apart, Rebecca and Russell showed strength for each of their daughters during an especially difficult time.

On May 20th, after 120 consecutive nights at Ronald McDonald House Charities WA, Rebecca and Willow returned home after receiving the 'all clear' that she was now in remission.

During our stay at RMHC WA, COVID-19 hit. For Willow and me, who had only just adjusted to life away from home at RMHC WA, it meant more changes for us. We were unable to have Russell and April come and visit due to border restrictions. We were on our own. Resilience during this time meant for us that we had to be thankful that we had somewhere comfortable, caring and supportive to stay while Willow completed her treatment...

A HOME AWAY FROM HOME

HOUSE PROGRAM.

For Western Australian families with seriously ill children requiring medical treatment in Perth, RMHC WA provides them with quality supported accommodation 24/7, 365 days a year.



The 47-bedroom Nedlands
House is located at the QEII
Medical Centre, home to Perth
Children's Hospital. The House is
comprised of four different types
of rooms. These range from fully
self-contained isolation units,
rooms equipped with wheelchairaccessible bathrooms, larger
spaced rooms and standard rooms.

In 2020, 1,076 new and returning families accessed a total of 11,580 nights of supported accommodation.

As a result of COVID-19 restrictions and RMHC Global health and safety procedures, the number of families supported was reduced by almost 45% compared with 2019.

Children and families in our care stay for an average of 7 days at the Nedlands House.

PERTH CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL HOUSE


RMHC WA also provides supported accommodation within Perth Children's Hospital for parents and guardians of children in intensive care.

Working closely with the hospital's medical team, our Family Liaison Officers at our 'PCH House' understand the difficult and complex experience of having a critically ill child in indefinite treatment.

The 14 bedroom House boasts exceptional quality in a peaceful environment providing ease of access to their child day and night.

In 2020, 472 new and returning families were provided with 3,282 nights of supported accommodation. The average stay is 6 nights.

Ronald McDonald Family Rooms offer comforting sanctuaries in hospitals for families to rest, reconnect and relax during hospital visits.

Our Family Rooms are staffed by our Family Liaison Officers and volunteers to provide friendly, compassionate support.

RONALD MCDONALD FAMILY ROOM - PERTH CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL

Located on the Ground Floor of Perth Children's Hospital is the Ronald McDonald Family Room, proudly supported by Santos. Since opening in 2016 this Ronald McDonald Family Room has welcomed thousands of Western Australian families into the space to take a moment to regroup and relax while in Perth Children's Hospital.

In 2020, we warmly welcomed 23,153 visitors.

- · Information services to assist families navigate the hospital.
- Activities for children based around skill development and fun.
- · Change facilities and breastfeeding rooms.
- · Library facilities for families to access and borrow.

KULUNGA MOORT MIA – PERTH CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL

Kulunga Moort Mia, Noongar for Children's Place, is a culturally sensitive environment adjacent to the Ronald McDonald Family Room. Incorporated as part of our Ronald McDonald Family Room within PCH, Kulunga Moort Mia provides respite for families to connect with the support of extended family and community.

RONALD MCDONALD FAMILY ROOM - PEEL HEALTH CAMPUS

Peel Health Campus is located in Mandurah on the South West Coast of Western Australia, about 72kms from Perth. Our Ronald McDonald Family Room at Peel Health Campus is located within the Sariach Wing of the Paediatric Ward.

Opened in 2010 this Family Room was purpose-built for the free and exclusive use of parents, carers, guardians and their families with children undergoing treatment at Peel Health Campus. In 2020, we were proud to welcome 2,966 visitors into the Ronald McDonald Family Room Peel Health Campus. Visitors were able to access a range of support and services including:

- · A kitchenette with a microwave, tea, coffee and a fridge for storing food.
- Lounge and dining area with complimentary wi-fi and Foxtel.
- · Indoor and outdoor play area with a playground and space to run around outdoors.

FAMILY SANCTUARIES.

Our Ronald McDonald Family Retreats in Busselton and Bunbury offer a welcomed sanctuary for families to reconnect, relax and play together; an experience most of us take for granted.

The demands of complex or critical medical treatment of a child can be difficult on all family members. Time together to enjoy each other is an important part of family-centred care and healing.

At no charge, bereaved families or those with sick children, can book one of the retreats for a maximum of one week.

We have just had the most amazing week away. We had time at the beach and Georgie had her first ever dip in the ocean. A wonderful moment for us all. It has been almost two years since we have had time away as a family and truly enjoyed some quality time together.



BASS FAMILY FOUNDATION LEARNING CENTRE.

At Ronald McDonald House Charities WA, we believe in every child's potential to thrive through the adversity of illness or injury.

Far from home, schools and friends, our continued education programs, play and learning experiences provide essential support within WA's health and education sectors.

The Learning Centre at the Nedlands House is an inspirational learning and play environment where sick kids and siblings can participate in curriculum-based programs, make new friends and have some fun.

Run by the Learning Centre Coordinator, activities are specifically coordinated depending on age groups and include Bindi Bindi playgroup (0-4 years old). Tech Time (4-17 years old) and the Work of Heart program (4-17 years old).

BINDI BINDI

Bindi Bindi playgroup is designed to help develop young children's fine motor skills. The sessions are based on activities that include threading, cutting, stacking, as well as singing and story time.

TECH TIME

Launching in 2020, Tech Time brought children together virtually and enabled them to stay connected and learn online. A pivotal component of this program was funding provided by Fortescue which allowed us to purchase 20 iPads for the Learning Centre. The iPads became a core tool in Tech Time and ensured the children could continue learning whilst remaining socially distanced.

WORK OF HEART

The Work of Heart Program incorporates educational play and curriculum support to assist families in our care at the Nedlands House. The Work of Heart Program is an after-school program offering a range of educational activities for children. Activities are supported by volunteers called "EDHeads" who join the Learning Centre Coordinator to assist with sessions.





When your child falls ill and requires complex or critical medical

treatment far from home, attending school is often not a possibility.

I just wanted to thank you and the House very much for having Tyreece on the Learning Program this year. He has absolutely loved being on it and has come a long way with tutoring, so thank you for making this possible.

At the start of the year he was at level 0 for reading and now at the end of the year he is at level 10.

Sarah-Rose, Mum to Tyreece (10), Boyup Brook The Ronald McDonald Learning Program (RMLP) aims to bridge the gap for students whom often miss out on school due to a medical illness.

From kindergarten to Year 12, educational support equating to 40 hours of one-on-one tutoring is offered to children in need of assistance.

In 2020, the RMLP had an average of 153 students access the program per month.

The program caters to the needs of each individual child to enable optimum learning outcomes. Upon assessment, children can access a team of professionals that include registered teachers, psychologists, occupational and speech therapists in Perth and regional Western Australia.

Each year, the Charlie Bell Scholarship is awarded to a young adult who has made significant accomplishments in their education through the challenges of chronic illness.

The scholarship is a celebration to the legacy of McDonald's Charlie Bell who was a passionate champion of continued education for sick children.

In 2020 the Charlie Bell Scholarship recognised the achievements of two outstanding individuals, supported by the Ronald McDonald Learning Program, who exemplified determination, positivity, and belief in their future. One of those recipients is Amber Medlock.

Amber has multiple diagnoses including: Ehlers Danlos Syndrome, Gastroparesis, Postural Orthostatic Tachycardia Syndrome, Chronic Anemia and Anxiety.

Despite these medical challenges, Amber completed her Year 12 certificate at All Saints' College in Perth.

"Being chronically ill I've grown up around doctors, nurses and other vital health care workers developing a strong passion for becoming a health care industry worker. I intend to study the Bachelor of Nursing and Pre-Medicine Certificate."

Over the last 3 years, Amber has also maintained a part-time job at McDonald's Kwinana. In 2020 Amber completed her Certificate 2 in Retail Being chronically ill I've grown up around doctors, nurses and other vital health care workers developing a strong passion for becoming a health care industry worker. I intend to study the Bachelor of Nursing and Pre-Medicine Certificate.

Services at McDonald's Kwinana and is now progressing her Certificate 3.

"During my first 6 months of employment I was promoted to a Crew Training role and made part of the safety squad. After I turn 18, I plan to go on a course where I will be taught the required skills needed for the management position."

RMHC WA Family Support Coordinators (FSCs) Tammy (Malaysian-Aboriginal) and Richard (Whadjuk, Noongar and Wongutha descent/Aboriginal lineage), provide end to-end support for all our families from initial enquiry and across their medical treatment journey in Perth.

Tammy and Richard also provide colleagues with regular cultural awareness training. During NAIDOC Week 2020, Tammy and Richard provided sessions where staff learnt about cultural history, perception of Indigenous peoples, cultural challenges and solutions.

Georgia-Rose, is a 22-year-old, proud Whadjuk Noongar woman from Perth. She is one of our muchloved volunteers who donates her time, energy and compassion for seriously ill children and families in our care.

No matter who you are, we all have culture. Each person's culture is important; it's part of what makes us who we are.

I am a proud Noongar Woman with traditional ties to the Whadjuk, Ballardong and Gnaala Karla Boodja peoples. I am the direct descendent and granddaughter of the highly respected Noongar Whadjuk elders - Mr Patrick and Lorna Hume.

I grew up watching my grandparents spending their lives promoting Aboriginal rights and Noongar culture within both government departments and the wider community. It is because of them; I too have decided to devote my life to the same causes. This makes me proud to be Noongar and seeing what they achieved in helping others.

Because of their positive influence on me, I have been driven to enhance and improve opportunities for Aboriginal people in all areas within the community.

I do this because I strive to keep their legacy alive and to ensure Aboriginal people have a voice and are heard.

My culture ultimately defines who I am and has been the primary influence that has taken me on the pathway and journey I am currently on and I will always continue to explore opportunities for Aboriginal people to make a difference for the better. It's not about me but about how many I can take on the journey with me. I strongly believe that to

move forward you must give back to others to make a difference in the world.

In its broadest sense 'reconciliation' means 'coming together'.
Reconciliation has elements of truth, justice, forgiveness, healing, reparation, and love. Supporting reconciliation means working to overcome the division (often called "the gap") and inequality between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people.

Reconciliation is a difficult concept, as there was no 'conciliation' to begin with, i.e. no treaty with the First Nation of this country. However, putting that aside, I see the Reconciliation process as bringing the Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people together, to acknowledge the pain and loss of the Aboriginal people and do what can be done to make up for the loss of language, culture, family, land etc., for the betterment of Aboriginal education and health and to raise awareness of Aboriginal issues in the general community.

At its heart, reconciliation is about strengthening relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and non-Aboriginal peoples, for the benefit of all Australians. A reconciled Australia is one where our rights as First Australians are not just respected but championed in all the places that matter.







SOUTH WEST ENGAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Comprising of 8 members and chaired by Neema Premji, the Committee provides invaluable support through events and advocacy connecting community with the essential service RMHC WA provides local families in the region.

The Bunbury Cup Gala Dinner which took place in March was a highlight, raising approximately \$32,000.00 for RMHC WA supported accommodation, services and programs.

A wonderful opportunity to connect with the South West community presented itself to the Committee, through the inaugural WA Giving Day. SWEC pledged their support and created their own WA Giving Day team, raising over \$2,500.00.

The end of the year saw SWEC host an intimate sundowner and dinner event at the Bunbury Dolphin Discovery Centre for Ride for Sick Kids participants.

For the riders' half-way through their journey, the event provided poignant motivation with the opportunity to connect with RMHC WA families, supporters and stakeholders.

DIGGING DEEP FOR RMHC WA

Located in the Goldfields region of Western Australia is 'Brilly' a mine site water management business. Founded in Kalgoorlie, the company is focused on servicing the Goldfields, Murchison and Mid-West regions of WA.

Brilly engaged Brooks Hire for an excavator to conduct works at

the Edna May Minesite – located approximately halfway between Perth and Kalgoorlie. Brooks Hire identified that the remote location of the site aligned with the service that RMHC WA provides to regional WA families with seriously ill children.

When Brooks Hire made the decision to donate part of the hire rate of the machine to RMHC WA, a collaborative pledge was made by Brilly to equal Brooks' donation dollar for dollar.

The 'Big Blue Digger', as it has been affectionately coined, has become a blue beacon of joy in remote Western Australia. We would like to thank Brooks Hire for their support of RMHC WA through this initiative.

FAMILY STORY

A HOME AWAY FROM HOME.

Over 2,000kms away from Perth in Western Australia's Kimberley region is the town of Broome. In 2020, 13% of the families supported at RMHC WA, called Broome home. One of those families is the Biggs Family.



Harper (4) and Arthur (4) are twin boys who were born prematurely at 24 weeks. Their premature birth resulted in a range of complications which required them to be hospitalised for over 5 months. Together, with resilience, the boys have battled chronic lung disease and infections. Arthur suffered from a brain bleed which resulted in hydrocephalus (a build-up of fluid in the cavities deep within the brain). At a very vulnerable, and young age, Arthur required a shunt to be placed inside his head to drain excess fluid

For the past 4 years, RMHC WA has been a home away from home for the whole family, with Nicola (Mum) and Steven (Dad), travelling to Perth with the boys for their ongoing critical medical treatments.

Nicola says the boys' have many superpowers that keeps them on their toes, calling them the 'Twintastic Tornadoes'. "As the Twintastic Tornadoes Arthur and Harper's superpower is causing craziness, mischief, mayhem, and mess everywhere it goes – but looks pretty amazing!"

Since 2016 RMHC WA has provided the family with supported accommodation for over 200 nights, across 26 separate stays. Nicola says it has become a much-loved second home for the family.

"It's a true home away from home, a place where you can recharge your batteries after full days at the hospital, a hot meal which you don't have to cook, and a safe haven for the boys to treat it like a second home. It has helped us immensely



and financially over the years, not having to pay for accommodation, as we have no family in WA (or anywhere in Australia)."

In 2020, the family had the chance to enjoy a holiday together in the Ronald McDonald Family Retreat in Busselton. It was time away from the stress of travelling and hospital appointments. Nicola says it was the family's first time in WA's South West, and there were so many activities for the boys to do.

"It was our first time visiting the Busselton Family Retreat – and what a holiday it was! It was the perfect location right by the beach. We could easily cycle to the foreshore, there were so many activities to do with the boys in and around Busselton, which we are so appreciative of, as it cost us nothing!"

For regional Western Australian families, having a seriously ill child who requires medical treatment far from home in Perth is scary and difficult. For Nicola and Steven, this battle is doubled. The Biggs family inspires us with their resilience, choosing to take every day as it comes and enjoying fun moments together, as a family.

MALCOLM LONGBOTTOM GOING THE DISTANCE.

The Longbottom family and Ronald McDonald House Charities WA have shared a special bond spanning 30 years.

Malcolm Longbottom and his family live in Grass Patch, in the Mallee Region (Goldfields-Esperance) of Western Australia. From this remote town, it's an 8-hour drive to Perth.

In 1991, Malcolm Longbottom's one-year old daughter, Danielle, almost drowned. Danielle's casualty required the family to travel to Perth for critical medical care. It was during this time that the family was first supported by Ronald McDonald House Charities Western Australia, at the original Subiaco House.

Thankfully, Danielle recovered, however it wasn't the end of the family's challenges. Malcolm's son Brodie was born with neurological complications and diagnosed with a rare chromosome disorder. Brodie's diagnosis would require more frequent trips to Perth to receive the medical treatment he needed. Twenty years on, Brodie continues to thrive but his health remains a constant concern.

Experiencing first-hand the impact of having a seriously ill child far from critical medical treatment in Perth, Malcolm became an avid fundraiser for RMHC WA.

My motivation to support Ronald McDonald House comes from knowing I am helping to support all regional families to have that all-important support that helped us when in need.

Since 2017, Malcolm has participated in Ride for Sick Kids WA, individually raising over \$100,000.00 for RMHC WA.

For Malcolm, fundraising for RMHC WA means that his contribution helps ensure the House continues to be a home away from home for regional WA families going through the most difficult time of their lives.



A MESSAGE FROM THE TREASURER.

The Home Away from Home Inc (T/as Ronald McDonald House Charities Western Australia) has seen a strong result for the financial year (ended 31 December 2020), despite a global pandemic. Ronald McDonald House Charities WA (RMHC WA) recorded a Comprehensive Surplus of \$248,831 and a Net Asset position of \$42,126,616.

The financial statements are audited and compliant to the standards required by the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC), the Western Australian Department of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety (DMIRS) and all relevant accounting standards.

The World Health Organisation (WHO) declared the COVID-19 outbreak a Public Health Emergency of International concern in January 2020. In March 2020, WHO declared the outbreak of COVID-19 a pandemic. The outbreak had a significant impact on RMHC WA's operations and fundraising activities.

The cancellation of flagship RMHC WA events such as Up All Night and the Ball, due to COVID-19 restrictions, had a significant impact on donation revenue in 2020. RMHC WA saw a reduction in donations from \$4.570,036 in 2019, down to \$2.857,314 in 2020. Despite this difference, it should be noted that individual donations contributed by community increased. This is a testament of the support for Western Australian families with seriously ill children by the WA community.

Ensuring the safety and wellbeing of WA families with seriously ill children is at the forefront of our service delivery. In response to COVID-19, operational costs were increased (particularly for cleaning and security) to ensure the protection of families was maintained at the highest standard.

It is a privilege to continue to support RMHC WA in the position of Treasurer for a third year. The inevitable reach and impact of COVID-19 in Western Australia, meant that financial initiatives planned for 2020 were rigorously re-examined in pursuit of optimum sustainability. Continued increase in demand for service inspired innovative compassion and determination to ensure every family's circumstance is understood with empathy, care and fit-for need support. Swift, strategic decisions ensured that we became a stronger and more agile organisation, returning to our trajectory for growth by December 2020.

The leadership of CEO Peter King and the financial management of Executive Manager, Business Services Luke Mason was exceptional. I also acknowledge the significant efforts of the Development and Marketing team and their valued partners across corporate and community.

The strength and resilience displayed by the volunteers, administration team, operations team, and learning program team was remarkable. I extend my sincerest thanks to all of these people for their contribution and dedication to the service throughout the year, which made a significant impact in the lives of families from every region across the state.

It has been a privilege to work with my fellow Board of Directors throughout the year. Together, we have delivered strong corporate governance and maintained a robust financial framework to ensure that the impact of COVID-19 on the service was kept minimal. Thank you for your support and contribution to RMHC WA and the families they care for.
